

The 4-H Difference



What is 4-H All About?

4-H is a community of youth across not only Texas, but the United States who are learning leadership, citizenship, and life skills. The 4-H program is all about having fun and making 4-H work for you! In 4-H, young people get a chance to make new friends, develop new skills, and find new passions.

What Do You Do in 4-H?

4-H about offering hands-on experiences to youth so they are able to "learn by doing". Members participate in a variety of learning experiences called 4-H projects. These 4-H projects are a specific area of interest for that 4-H member. The best part about 4-H is some of these projects can be self-directed or done in a group setting. With over 40 projects areas to choose from in the Texas 4-H program, there are opportunities for everyone interested. Project areas in 4-H range from our traditional livestock projects to some of the more non-traditional of robotics and everything in between!

What Does a 4-H Club Do?

When enrolling in the 4-H program on 4-HOnline, you are asked which 4-H club you want to be a member of. This 4-H club will be the main way of finding out what is happening within Potter County 4-H! These clubs will elect their own officers and conduct their own business throughout the 4-H year. The business meetings are on a regular basis, depending on the manager of your club these meeting could take place monthly, bi-monthly, or even quarterly, During the business meetings, usually a club will make plans for upcoming activities, host community service events, or have educational programs planned. These educational programs might be presented by fellow 4-H members, county extension agents, or even members of a specific industry (a vet, beekeeper, etc.).

Potter 4-H Newsletter

With over 200 4-H members in Potter County 4-H, our monthly newsletter is the number one form of communication between all 4-H'ers, parents, and the Extension Office. It is the responsibility of the 4-H'er to read the newsletter to stay up to date on everything happening in Potter County 4-H. The newsletter contains information like upcoming dates, contest, or educational opportunities. The newsletter can be found on our county webpage, the email account that you submitted when registering on 4-HOnline, and through social media.

4-H Membership Policy



Any person, regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, religion, disability or national origin, may enroll as a 4-H member.

Texas 4-H activities and events are open to enrolled members between the ages of 9 (or 8 AND in the 3rd grade) and 18 on August 31.

Events that require registration, certification or entry during the summer prior to the beginning of the 4-H year – County Extension agents may sign entry forms for events that will occur during the 4-H year for youths who will become eligible for and enroll in 4-H on September 1, but these youths may not participate in 4-H competitive events and activities until September 1.

First, an adult leader brings together youth that have common interests. Second, the youth choose one or more projects. Projects are chosen from over thirty project areas offered. Third, the group enrolls as a club, and forth, meets together to learn and have FUN. Clubs are able to explore 4-H activities, events and trips. In 4-H, there are events happening all year round.

Parents Role in 4-H



Good youth development programs do not just happen. It takes the combined effort of parents and volunteers along with the guidance of Extension youth development professionals to establish a good 4-H program.

Why Parent Participation?

Through research and experience, a number of positive effects on 4-H, 4-H clubs and 4-H members can be attributed to active parent participation.

- Active parent participation can strengthen and broaden the 4-H program in a local club or county.
- 4-H work would be totally impossible without the active support of interested parents.
- Extending a helping or encouraging hand to a boy or girl is one of the finest ways you can express affection to your children and other youth.
- 4-H is a family affair offering parents many opportunities to participate in a program with their child and build family unity.
- When parental support is good, individual club members receive more personal attention and guidance from leaders and parents.
- Club activities and events will develop and expand with the added support of parents.
- 4-H has a positive influence on the lives of thousands of boys and girls. This happens only when parents care enough to share their time, efforts, and talents.

4-H Brings the Family Together

Closer family unity comes from planning, sharing, and working together. When a family works as a team the strengths, skills, and worth of each family member can be developed and appreciated. With love and understanding, patience and counsel, a parent can offer their child a solid start in a pleasant and beneficial experience. The family becomes a team.

What can parents do to support and help in the 4-H Program?

- Learn what 4-H is about. (purpose, objectives, etc.)
- Exhibit a genuine interest and enthusiasm in 4-H and in your child.
- Encourage participation in 4-H activities. Participation stimulates interest and enthusiasm.
- Assist your child in selecting a project they will enjoy, a project they have the ability to accomplish, and one for which you can assist with.
- Provide transportation for members to local club meetings, county events, and various activities.
- Attend club meetings with your child.
- Get informed as to "What is going on" and continue to be informed.
- Volunteer to be a project or club leader. All adults have abilities that would greatly assist the 4-H program.
- Serve on a committee to help plan and conduct special club activities and events.
- Attend Parent Leader Meetings.

Head over to 4-HOnline (https://v2.4honline.com/#/user/sign-in) and start the enrollment process. If you are enrolling a third grader, please wait until September 1 to enroll for proper fees to be accessed. ALL YOUTH and ADULTS that participte in 4-H programming need to enroll in the 4-H program!

4-H Record Books



Each 4-H member is encourage to keep a record of his or her 4-H work. Record are not an extra task, but a part of the learning experience! By your 4-her recording this activities that can keep track of all the different learning experiences they have had in the 4-H program. Record Books are open to all age divisions (junior, intermediate, and senior age divisions).

Through 4-H Record Books, your 4-Her will learn how to set goals, keep track of task/awards/contest, and reflect on what they learned throughout the year.

4-Hers learn:

- To communicate in writing
- To organize thoughts
- To set goals and work towards these goals
- To make short and long term goals
- To evaluate a record of growth from year to year
- To recognize skills learned, goals accomplished and successes experienced

4-H Record Books have four main parts:

- 1. Check Sheet
- 2. Personal Information Page
- 3.4-H Story & Photo Portfolio
- 4. Report Forms
- 1. A 4-H record book teaches a desirable habit. Modern day society demands that each and everyone, no matter what vocation, keep track of financial and business matters. Developing this habit early in life will be a valuable asset.
- 2. A 4-H record book is a measuring stick. Members and leaders are kept informed of the member's progress and will usually stimulate self-improvement by the member.
- 3. A 4-H record book is a mirror. It will reflect accomplishments and therefore serve as the basis for awards, trips, and other recognition.
- 4. A 4-H record book provides youth with a time for reflection about who they are, what their goals are, what they have accomplished in the past year, etc.

Record books are required to receive star awards at the county achievement banquet.

1st Year Award:

Rookie of the Year: (for any aged 4-H member)

- completed at least one (1) year in 4-H
- submit complete 4-H record book

Junior Award:

Bronze Star: (for members in 4th and 5th grade as of August 31, 2017)

- completed at least two (2) years in 4-H
- submit complete 4-H record book

Intermediate Award:

- completed at least three (3) years in 4-H including the current year submit complete 4-H record book

- completed Texas 4-H Gold Star Application (turn in with this form)
- exhibited leadership skills by serving as a 4-H officer or committee chairman (club, county, district or state), and/or as a junior or teen leader in an activity or project with or under the supervision of an adult volunteer leader.
- participated in one or more community service activities. Examples include providing leadership to a One Day 4-H project, working with or counseling junior 4-H members; participating in community service projects (individual, group or club); and motivating other 4-H members through participation in demonstrations, projects and/or exhibits.
